

# A FOOL'S SPRING...

A mostly dry and mild start to winter saw many farms stocking fields well into the new year, which on one hand made for respectable savings in both feed costs and labour but has also led to extra stress on leys during a time of limited growth. However, the fools spring ended abruptly with a succession of storms across the region bringing high levels of rainfall and ultimately flooding. This has highlighted the benefits of continuous "green" cropping to prevent soil erosion and nutrient run off.

Now is the time for an early spring assessment, singling out fields which have suffered from poaching, underperforming leys and planning rotational reseeds, arable and forage crops for the season ahead.



# TO RESEED OR REJUVINATE... THAT IS THE QUESTION

When it comes to grassland productivity, many don't realise that to merely "stand still" you need to reseed on average 10% of your farm per year. It's not until you hit 15% that tangible returns are seen. Reseeding still offers the best return on investment, but sometimes it's just not possible to take land out of production, that's where rejuvenation comes in.

Although this is a short to medium term solution, the principles of establishment are not too dissimilar to a reseed with soil nutrition a top priority. We recommend soil sampling before any reseed to establish pH, P&K indexes as well as inspecting the soil profile for any signs of compaction. Any remedial work should be done before getting the drill out. Mixture choice is key to creating a productive, useful ley and we can advise on the right mixture for your needs.

## TREADING THE TRAMLINES...



The mild winter has seen crops entering spring quite forward enough. Wet and warm conditions mean early disease pressure is high with mildew and septoria particularly problematic in some crops. TO fungicide applications may be more commonplace on all farms this year and a programmed approach to disease control is always advisable. As the old adage goes "prevention is better than the cure". Another consideration when looking at forward crops is a robust PGR programme to ensure crops are well rooted or "anchored" and cells develop strong walls giving crops better standing power. #### LAMB & EWE

2021 was a brilliant year for lambs and we hope spring 2022 will follow suit. Over the past 12 months the average deadweight price was 582.3p/kg for 2021 compared to just 479.1p/kg in 2020, a 103.2p/kg difference ((gov.uk). Ensuring lambs get the right nutrition from day one is essential for hitting target weights/grades, killing out well and meeting daily live



weight gains. With prices across the industry rising, buying the right product at the right price is more important than ever.

Ewes that can maintain their condition post lambing will be more likely to perform better in following seasons, increasing your lambing percentages. Ewe lambs that will be bred from in their first season also need to reach 60% of their mature body weight pre-breeding, good nutrition is essential so that they grow a good frame and that their longevity as breeding ewes is not compromised" - Bethan Till, For Farmers Ruminant Specialist
